Pastor's _____ Beloved in Christ,

Message Our Old Testament readings from Samuel and Jonah are two guys being called by God to deliver a message of destruction if there isn't change. Samuel to Eli, the priest, and Jonah to the people of Nineveh,

both announcing God's intended punishment, one for not following the sacrificial rules and the other for turning away from God. Samuel, just a boy, spoke the truth to Eli the old priest, who accepted it to be true and deserving. Jonah, a very resistant man, spoke the truth to the people of Nineveh, they listened and repented, turned away from their sinful behavior, and followed God.

In St Mark's gospel, is the calling of the disciples, four men, who had heard very little about Jesus, left their boats and families to follow Jesus, who promised to give them new jobs, and a partnership in His ministry. Both accounts are about listening and taking action, even if there were skid marks, God made sure it happened as I assume God wanted it to happen.

Something very common for many people and churches is that at times we become complacent with the world. Our response to what we see and hear, might be, "It is what it is, can't do anything about it, so just have to accept it." Or, "I'm tired of hearing all about it so I quit watching the news." I find myself saying or thinking these very thoughts, "Just let me stick my head in the sand, and let the world move on by."

In the Bible readings, I hear the very opposite, "There's work to do," or as our granddaughter use to say, "Suck it up buttercup." At times it feels to me like we're just coasting through life, ignoring God's call to action, to do the tough stuff, or say the tough words.


In reading an article about civil rights, the author said, "Instead of accepting the things we can't change, change the things we can't accept." I believe we the beloved of God here at New Salem, work at following this quote, putting forth, sometimes great efforts and risks to change "the unacceptable things, the unjust treatment of people, and seeing others as beloved people of God too."



The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by Rick.

Congregational Officers: President: Rick Bogart, VP: Jon Severson, Secretary: Eric Medberry, Treasurer: Sue Rosselet **Devotion** - Rick - Next month will be Jon

Approval of the January 16th, 2024 Meeting Agenda: Sue moved approval; Calli seconded; passed. Approval of the December 19th, 2023 Meeting Minutes: Fred moved approval; Jon seconded; passed

Pastor's Update: • Leave for surgery - Feb 27th - through (hopefully) March 24th

○ Pastoral needs during Pr. Terry's leave: ■ Sunday mornings ● Pastor will work with the Synod to get a list of names
■ On-call pastor for visits and funerals ■ Lenten schedule

• Sue moved to approve a cancellation of Lenten services except for Ash Wednesday, seek to have Sundays covered until Pastor can return, and look for an on-call pastor for visits and funerals during that same time; Bob seconded. Discussion ensued. Motion carried.

• We reviewed the Mission Plan for 2024 ○ We did end the year in the black ■ 10% of e surplus will go to the Synod ■ Giving increased this year ○ Monthly benevolences for our local partners continues to be strong ○ We will continue to support the Capital Improvement Fund (CIF) through the General Fund in 2024 ■ We discussed transferring some of the CIF into a CD ● Calli will pull some rates for discussion at next meeting ○ We continue to pay the extra \$100 on our mortgage ● Report was accepted and filed

Old Business:

• Council Nominations for 2024 - Bob Wagner has agreed to submit his name for the 2-year term and Eric Medberry and Rick Bogart have agreed to submit their names for 3-year terms. Graig Gilbertson has agreed to submit his name for a 3-year term.

• Annual Meeting - January 28, 2024 - Congregation potluck to follow

- Commercial rack to secure audio equipment has been ordered and scheduled for installation in February
- Rick updated changes in our property insurance Details on roof replacement have changed We are still in decent shape and no new action is required, but will wait until new numbers come out in March
- Earned Sick & Safe Time (ESST): Discussion about how it impacts our staff \circ Applies to anyone working more than 80 hours a year and not currently getting PTO \circ Would require more official record keeping for hours worked
- Bob moved that we require signed timesheets as mandated by the state so that earned time can be awarded and applied to qualified employees; Calli seconded Discussion ensued. Motion carried.

• Fred moved to change our council meeting time to 6:30 and allow teams to still meet from 6 to 6:30. Second by Dave. Motion carried. It was also agreed to meet on Monday, 19th in Feb as many can't make Tuesday, 20th.

January 21st First City Handbell Choir provided special music for our worship service.

They also treated us to a short concert after service.

Over the past months, a group of New Salem people have been engaged in learning about the history and culture of our Indigenous brothers and sisters. We have read and continue to read and discuss books and articles. We continue to learn!

In May, some of us walked with our Indigenous people in honoring and remembering Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) and Girls; in June, in keeping with the ELCA's request that congregations dedicate a Sunday service to MMIW, we had a special service; on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, we integrated a Thanksgiving Address that many native cultures use and which gives thanks to Mother Earth and all that the Creator has given and entrusted to us.

A natural next step is to consider having a Land Acknowledgement statement for New Salem. The topic raises many questions and we welcome yours and your input. Materials are available on the table in the narthex. Please read them and join the discussions on Wednesdays.



What is a Land Acknowledgement?

A Land Acknowledgment is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories.

Why is Land Acknowledgement Important? A land acknowledgment is a formal way to recognize the Indigenous peoples who have come before you, and who were removed — often violently — from their land due to colonization.

To recognize the land is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory you reside on, and a way of honoring the Indigenous people who have been living and working on the land from time immemorial.

Minnesota is centered within Dakota creation stories and is an important place in traditional Ojibwe history. Along with the **Dakota and Ojibwe**, the **Ho-Chunk, Cheyenne, Oto, Iowa, and the Sac & Fox tribes** also acknowledge Minnesota as important to their tribal histories. 
