The 2025 Black History Month theme, **African Americans and Labor**, focuses on the various and profound ways that work and working of all kinds – free and unfree, skilled, and unskilled, vocational and voluntary – intersect with the collective experiences of Black people. Indeed, work is at the very center of much of Black history and culture. Be it the traditional agricultural labor of enslaved Africans that fed Low Country colonies, debates among Black educators on the importance of vocational training, self-help strategies and entrepreneurship in Black communities, or organized labor's role in fighting both economic and social injustice,

Black people's work has been transformational throughout the U.S., Africa, and the Diaspora. The 2025 Black History Month theme, "African Americans and Labor," sets out to highlight and celebrate the potent impact of this work.

Africans were brought to the Americas to be enslaved for their knowledge and serve as a workforce, which was superexploited by several European countries and then by the United States government. During enslavement, Black people labored for others, although some Black people were quasi-free and labored for themselves, but operated within a country that did not value Black life. After fighting for their freedom in the Civil War and in the country's transition from an agricultural based economy to an industrial one, African Americans became sharecroppers, farm laborers, landowners, and then wage earners.

The theme intends to encourage broad reflections on intersections between Black people's work and their workplaces in all their iterations and key moments, themes, and events in Black history and culture across time and space and throughout the U.S., Africa, and the Diaspora. Like religion, social justice movements, and education, studying African Americans' labor and labor struggles are important organizing foci for new interpretations and reinterpretations of the Black past, present, and future. Such new considerations and reconsiderations are even more significant as the historical forces of racial oppression gather new and renewed strength in the 21st century.

New Salem Service Group Sunday January 19, 2025

Present: Karyn Lutz, president, B. and Roger Olson, Stu and Sue Rosselet, Dora Lee Souder, Shelly and Bob Quinlan, Marge and Gary Danielson, Ardis Hofstad, Hailey Mack, Paster Terry Hagensen and Joy Johnson, secretary, B Olson made coffee.

As worship service had just concluded, there was no additional devotion. The minutes from the October 14th meeting were reviewed, a motion made to approve by Sue Rosselet, seconded by B Olson, and motion carried.

The treasurer's report indicated in December there were disbursements for staff gifts, craft show fees and kitchen items, leaving approximately \$4400 for distribution today. The treasurer's report was received for filing.

Old Business

The group thanked Hailey Mack for preparing Christmas bags for youth. There was extensive discussion regarding the Fall Bazaar. There was a motion by B Olson, seconded by Ardis Hofstad, to allow the 4-H club to continue to have a free booth. Also, it was determined that there is no reason to separate funds from each of New Salem sponsored events, or to count tickets associated with each raffle item. There was discussion about the need for more help with the last hour or so of the raffle. New Salem craft sales were significantly down over the prior year, but it was decided to keep the craft sale component and increase visibility and awareness. B Olson also suggested there be planned events around group crafting to garner support. Hailey Mack offered to assist in promotion and marketing of this. Sue Rosselet brought up that half the proceeds from outside vendor booths had gone into the NSLC general fund when the initial decision was all would be transferred. The consensus was that the other would be transferred, consistent with the original decision. That brought the amount available today for charitable giving down to approximately \$4200. Discussion occurred around signage, both at New Salem booths and at the entrance, stating that all proceeds go to local community charities. There was no date chosen for the 2025 Fall Bazaar but it was consensus that it be early November, avoiding other major craft events.

New Business

Distribution of funds for local charities was discussed and recommendations heard. Sue Rosselet made a motion, seconded by Ardis Hofstad to give \$1000 to the Food Shelf, People's Church, and The Nameless Coalition, \$500 to DAV and United Way, and \$200 to Lutheran World Relief, where there may be matching funds. Motion carried.

- Prayer shawls are ready for the four confirmation students and Paster Terry will do the presentation February 9th .
- Ardis Hofstad agreed to lead the efforts for New Salem's rummage sale on April 5th .
- There was consensus to change the service group meeting time to after Sunday worship services.
- A kitchen cleaning date will be decided at the next meeting, on March 9th .




