Pastor's Message

Happy New Year, do we stick to the tradition of making resolutions, declaring what we're going to change or do differently in 2024 than we did in 2023? We get excited and determined, and we declare to ourselves and others, "No this year I'm going to stick to them." Let me

confess when I've made New Year's resolutions, by January 2nd, I'm admitting to myself, "There's no way I'm going to keep these, who am I trying to kid?" How many of you have done the same, or something similar?

I'm assuming we make resolutions with the hope of making much-needed changes, mostly to improve the quality of life, for ourselves and others. There's lots of good here, as we become aware of those parts of our lives needing some improvement or to be eliminated. It's good to be tuned into what is happening in and around us, and wanting things to be different.

The part of making resolutions I find difficult is the lack of grace we give ourselves, reminding ourselves change comes slowly and with great effort. We tend to be too hard on ourselves, being disappointed, feeling failure, or some level of these.

St Paul writes how God has showered God's grace on us, the grace of forgiveness, of new hope, strength, and peace, and many other forms of grace. God's grace is about recognizing our sins or failures, confessing them, and trying again. Grace is the opposite of judgment. We hear of and know in our minds about grace, yet lack it in our hearts, where faith says it's true.

It is by faith we accept and celebrate God's grace, God's freedom to be who we are, allowing us to fail and try again. I witness many people who expend a lot of energy judging themselves, focusing on their failures, while missing the Holy Spirit's whispering you're forgiven, it's expected you'll fail, it doesn't mean you're a failure, it means you're human.

One of the greatest changes in my life was when I came to believe in the true grace of God, as it grew and I accepted it more, a newfound freedom arrived in my life. The freedom to be who God created and formed me to be, to accept my humanity, and to see the world and others through the eyes of grace.

I believe once we accept and experience God's grace, we become more gracious towards others. We begin to see others and their actions through the eyes of grace, allowing them to be who God has created and formed them to be, it's practicing the same grace God gives to us with others. We begin to overlook mistakes, judge less, and love more.

So go ahead and make resolutions, but practice grace with yourself, remembering God's grace is the model to follow. Happy New Year!





Our kids decided to use these funds to help other kids in our community.

They donated \$500 to Backpack Buddies which is coordinated by the United Way of Bemidji. The Backpack Buddies program was developed to help ensure that children in the Bemidji school district have access to nutritious, non-perishable and easy-to-prepare food at times when other resources are not available, such as weekends and school vacations.

The rest was donated to PLAA (Play and Learn for All Abilities) to help make Bemidji's elementary school playgrounds accessible for all children.

"Children with mobility challenges need accessible playgrounds so they can enjoy both the social and emotional benefits of playing with their peers and the health benefits of using balance skills, working their large muscles and improving coordination." PLAA's mission is to make Bemidji Area School District's elementary playgrounds more accessible by replacing surfaces and some equipment and they will be starting with Solway Elementary School in spring. 

One of more than 20 Bemidji area churches led by the Spirit of Christ to work together to meet the emergency needs of homeless and lowincome people in a prayerful way, New Salem Lutheran Church has supported the work of Churches United for many years.

Through the various services it provides, Churches United assists impoverished people and people experiencing homelessness. There are three specific areas in which you can help Churches United transform the lives of those Churches United serves.

- 1. Financial Support: Churches United relies upon financial contributions from its participant churches to provide these diverse services but contributions from individuals are also quite important. Churches United accepts donations year round (cash or check). Note: All donations are tax deductible.
- 2. Volunteering: Churches United is open and continuing to follow COVID 19 protocols. We ask for just four (4) hours of your time per month. We have a job for you, no matter what your skill set is. If you like helping people, greeting people, filing paperwork, data entry, or just organizing the office; we have a job for you.
- 3. Donations: Churches United is taking donations of hygiene products, quilts, clean blankets, towels, etc. Please call ahead to be sure the office is staffed. All donations are quarantined for 72 hours prior to being inventoried and distributed. They are currently in need of the following items to help serve its clients:

God's Work, Our Treasure—January 2024

This month New Salem is lifting up the work of a mission partner, Churches United, and urges you to consider the various ways you might support this valuable ministry.

You can send your check to New Salem and indicate it is for the work of Churches United And we will forward your gift to them.

Please prayerfully consider how you might support the work of this important ministry.

Over the past months, a group of New Salem people have been engaged in learning about the history and culture of our Indigenous brothers and sisters. We have read and continue to read and discuss books and articles. There is much to learn.

We've taken a few small steps. In May, some of us walked with our Indigenous people in honoring and remembering Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW); in June, in keeping with the ELCA's request that congregations dedicate a Sunday service to MMIW, we had a special service; on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, we integrated a Thanksgiving Address that many native cultures use and which gives thanks to Mother Earth and all that the Creator has given and entrusted to us.

A natural next step, as we continue to learn, is to consider having a Land Acknowledgement statement for New Salem. There are many examples of such statements and a few relevant ones are given here. The topic raises many questions and we welcome yours and your input. At a minimum, such a statement should be read, printed, and displayed at New Salem on a regular basis to remind us to honor and show appreciation to our Indigenous neighbors. Materials are available on the table in the narthex. Please read them and join the discussion.

National Museum of the American Indian Land Acknowledgement

We gratefully acknowledge the Native Peoples on whose ancestral homelands we gather, as well as the diverse and vibrant Native communities who make their home here today.

Bemidji State University Land Acknowledgement

We acknowledge that Bemidji State University is located on land and water that is the current and ancestral homeland of the Ojibwe and Dakota. We acknowledge the painful history of genocide, forced assimilation and efforts to alienate the Indigenous inhabitants from their territory here. We honor and respect the many diverse Indigenous peoples still connected to this land, retained tribal sovereignty, treaty rights and cultural resilience. Indigenous people are spiritual and physical caretakers of this land to which we all belong. Bemidji State University respects these sacred lands, stands with the community members from these Nations and will fight injustice in all its forms.

What is a Land Acknowledgement?

A Land Acknowledgment is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories.

Why is Land Acknowledgement Important?

A land acknowledgment is a formal way to recognize the Indigenous peoples who have come before you, and who were removed — often violently — from their land due to colonization.

To recognize the land is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory you reside on, and a way of honoring the Indigenous people who have been living and working on the land from time immemorial.

Minnesota is centered within Dakota creation stories and is an important place in traditional Ojibwe history. Along with the **Dakota and Ojibwe**, the **Ho-Chunk**, **Cheyenne**, **Oto**, **Iowa**, **and the Sac & Fox tribes** also acknowledge Minnesota as important to their tribal histories.

NWMN Synod's Land Acknowledgement

The Northwestern Minnesota Synod of the ELCA is located within the traditional lands of the Indigenous People of Turtle Island (North America), the first Americans. These are the ancestral homelands of the Anishinaabe, Assiniboine, and Dakota people. Today we are called to follow Jesus alongside of our neighbors of the sovereign federally recognized tribes of the Red Lake and White Earth bands of the Ojibwa people. In affirming this land as the homeland of our indigenous neighbors, we recognize the legacies of violence and cultural genocide that occurred alongside the displacement of their communities, as well as the responsibility we all share to not let these truths be buried any longer.

Luther Seminary Land Acknowledgement

Luther Seminary is on Mini Sota Makh6che, the homelands of the Dakh6ta Oyate. The Ojibwe, Ho-Chunk, Cheyenne, Oto, Iowa, and the Sac & Fox also inhabited Minnesota land. We recognize that God calls all to be in right relationship with their neighbors, that the tribes are sovereign nations, that there is a history of broken treaties and broken trust, and that there is much reconciling work to be done. As Christians, we also recognize that in Christ there is new life, forgiveness, and hope for mending what is broken. We pray the Holy Spirit will lead us in this work.
