Sisters and Brothers in Christ, God's Grace and Peace be unto You.

Sometimes, it takes me a while to decide what to write in the Newsletter; time is spent listening to God for guidance, as I want it to be something of value. The topic finally came to me as I've been

listening to the words spoken just about everywhere I listen. What I don't hear much of is forgiveness and grace, but lots of judgment and shaming. I even hear it coming out of my own mouth, and find it dwelling in my heart.

Daily, we're faced with opportunities to decide: Do I forgive or judge? Sometimes, these are very personal encounters; we're hurt by someone or somehow, and there are times when it is less personal, what we see or hear in the world around. When these happen judgment is the first on the scene, and without any thought, it comes rushing out of our mouths, and at some level, we feel justified, for it's easier to point a finger than to look in the mirror. But remember, forgiveness is a powerful choice that can break the cycle of judgment and bring healing.

Jesus, in Matthew's gospel, the seventh chapter, says. "Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. ² For the judgment you give will be the judgment you get, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. ³ Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye but do not notice the log in your own eye? ⁴ Or how can you say to your neighbor, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' while the log is in your own eye? ⁵ You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye."

These words of Jesus ring in my heart when I'm looking in the mirror and listening to the world. I remind myself and those who'll listen that **SIN IS SIN**; none are worse than others in the eyes of Jesus. Yes, some cause more damage and hurt, and we want to put levels of degrees on sin, mostly so we don't have to look in the mirror. But Jesus reminds us to first examine our own hearts and actions before we judge others, fostering a spirit of self-reflection and forgiveness.

Jesus, in John's gospel chapter eight says. ⁷ When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."

We can't avoid sin for we all sin and fall short of the glory of God, but we can seek the help of the Holy Spirit, to slow us down, to reflect on what is in our hearts, to take a look in the mirror, all before we speak. We're living in a broken world, and forgiveness over judgment can and will make a difference. Beloved of God, let's all give it a try. Peace and Hope







New Salem Service Group Meeting June 10, 2024 6:35 PM

Attendees: Karyn Lutz, president, Linda Wolden, Karin Snortland, Donna Zelinsky, B Olson, Janet Tiegen, Krista Bogart, Sue Rosselet, Stu Rosselet, Vivian Krause, Marge Danielson and Joy Johnson reporting

Opening devotions were led by Joy Johnson. Sue Rosselet will do devotions at the August 12th meeting.

Minutes to the April 8, 2024 meeting were presented by secretary Joy Johnson and amended. B Olson moved to approve the amended minutes, seconded by Donna Zelinsky. Motion carried.

The treasurer's report was presented and distributed by Karin Snortland. She reported the items she had purchased for the church (heavy duty floor mat and other supplies) and results to the Spring rummage sale. Revenues were up 22% over last year's event with \$4,426 raised from the onsite sale, \$500.75 in donations to the two Ukrainian families, and \$325 from Kent Porter's sale. Total impact was \$5341.95. Karin also mentioned that this service group has donated a total of \$25,000 since 2019.

Karin suggested that the storage area off the nursery needs to be reorganized at some point. Krista volunteered that she and Rick Bogart would tackle it. Notes were sent to the DAV for picking up items after the rummage sale, to Lutz's for food donation, to Olson's for food donation and to Kent Porter for donating sale proceeds.

Old Business

<u>Prayer Shawls</u>: Prayer shawls are now being made by Dar Moen. Sue Rosselet is making baptismal shawls, with one completed and provided recently.

<u>Service Group Leadership</u>: Karyn announced that a president is still needed for this service group. It was suggested that it could also be a man. Krista Bogart will not be able to assume the role as they have purchased a house in Sartell, MN to be closer to their grandchildren and will spend winters there.

Rummage/Bake Sale: It was a big success and went very smoothly. It appeared to be quieter the last hour so consideration should be given to changing the hours to 8 am to 2 pm, instead of 3 pm.

<u>Sally Ellingson memorial money</u>: Donna Zelinsky made a motion, Joy Johnson seconded, to rescind the original decision to purchase chairs and instead use the Ellingson monies to buy altar candles holders. Motion carried. Sue Rosselet located a set and will handle the ordering of the item. We will consider getting them engraved with Sally's name once they are received.

New Business

<u>Bemidji Area Musicians Concert Luncheon</u>: will be held at New Salem on July 31st. Janet Tiegen is in charge of this event. Karyn will update volunteer sign-up sheets and will email to Janet for posting. The menu will be the same as prior years and the price will be \$8/meal. B Olson will buy groceries with a Thrivent card. Last minute items will be purchased by Sue & Stu (either Thrivent money or Service group monies will be used).

<u>Fall Bazaar</u>: will be held **November 2**nd and Karyn Lutz will chair this event. Sue Carlson was notified of date and will get the word out to area artisans/crafters now so that the date will be saved on their calendars. The church space can handle 10-12 area artisan/crafters. The church will have a bake sale and craft table. Karyn will reach out to Eric Medberry to invite the 4-H group to sell sticky buns and sliders again.

Kitchen Cleaning: It was suggested that a thorough cleaning of the kitchen is needed but could wait until Fall/Winter. Charitable Donations: The following New Salem Service Group donations were recommended:



News from our Community Food Shelf

It's not been slowing down at the food shelf. During May we saw another month of over 1,100 families consisting of 3,692 people come for food support, 201 of whom were first-time users. We distributed 74,131 lbs. of food which has a value to our community of \$125,000.

Summer is a time when people get busy with outdoor activities and traditionally, we see a decrease in financial support during this time, but we don't see a lessening of need.




