Sisters and brothers in Christ, greetings.

A couple of weeks ago, someone sent me a quote from scripture (a very good one) that was their Mantra for the week. It got me thinking, do others have mantras or words they follow to guide

their words, actions, and spiritual growth? Is there a favorite scripture passage they hold near their hearts that influences their actions, thoughts, and comments?

I see great value in having a mantra, phrase, or passage in scripture as a focal point and a go-to when we have questions about our lives, thoughts, words, and actions. One popular several years ago was "What Would Jesus Do?" WWJD

When I come across a passage in scripture, a poem, or a phrase that speaks to my heart, I'll hold on to it till I'm ready to move on, finding another as my guide, as many of us may do. From my experience, it's been a good practice to have one as it encourages me to think a little more, act differently, or use different words when speaking.

Many passages or stories in scripture make good guides for our lives and are suitable even to memorize. One familiar to many is John 3:16-17 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but so that the world might be saved through him. This has been called the gospel in a nutshell. This is a statement of our faith, a reminder of God's amazing love, and a great passage of scripture for Lent.

Luke 10:27 He (Jesus) answered, "You hall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." This a good passage when checking our thoughts, words, and actions.

When picking a guiding passage or phrase, I encourage all to decide if it is one you want to remember and use and is of sound Christian principles and values. One of the temptations we face is taking things at face value. In my experience, this can lead us down a road Christ wouldn't have us travel. A mantra or passage can be an excellent spiritual practice, and I encourage you to search for one.

New Salem's Highlighted Mission Partner — March 2023

Bemidji Community Food Shelf







For 41 years, support from you, your friends and neighbors has ensured that we can help those who go hungry in our community.

In 2022, we experienced a **45% increase** in the numbers of people seeking help, over **9,600 families**, reaching nearly **28,000 people**, resulting in the *distribution 600,000 lbs of food.*

Food banks say they are expecting an increase in demand as food aid is slashed.

A "hunger cliff" is looming for millions of Americans, with 32 states (including MN) set to slash food-stamp benefits beginning in March. The cuts will impact more than 30 million people who are enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, in those states, according to data from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Households are now struggling with high food costs — groceries were about 10% higher in December than a year earlier — making the timing of the SNAP cuts particularly challenging, experts say.

That means a family of four could see their monthly benefit cut by about \$328 a month. The worst-hit could be elderly Americans who receive the minimum monthly benefit, Ellen Vollinger, the SNAP director, said. They could see their SNAP payments tumble from \$281 to as little as \$23 per month. Meanwhile, 18 states had already ended their emergency allotments early. The remaining 32 states (incl. MN) that had continued the additional aid are losing that extra money in March due to a provision in the 2023 Omnibus spending bill, signed into law in December, that directs the emergency allotments to end next month.

It may seem like an oddity that SNAP enrollment has increased given that the nation's unemployment rate is at its <u>lowest since 1969</u>, but many workers still can't find full-time work or line up enough hours to pay the bills. What sometimes gets missed in that conversation is the part that so many SNAP households are employed, but often employed at low-wage levels — they aren't in jobs that are family-sustaining so they still qualify for SNAP," Vollinger added.




