

Reading of the Word

First Reading: Isaiah 65:1-9

¹I was ready to be sought out by those who did not ask, to be found by those who did not seek me. I said, "Here I am, here I am," to a nation that did not call on my name. ²I held out my hands all day long to a rebellious people, who walk in a way that is not good, following their own devices; ³ a people who provoke me to my face continually, sacrificing in gardens and offering incense on bricks; ⁴ who sit inside tombs, and spend the night in secret places; who eat swine's flesh, with broth of abominable things in their vessels; ⁵ who say, "Keep to yourself, do not come near me, for I am too holy for you." These are a smoke in my nostrils, a fire that burns all day long. ⁶ See, it is written before me: I will not keep silent, but I will repay; I will indeed repay into their laps ⁷ their iniquities and their ancestors' iniquities together, says the Lord; because they offered incense on the mountains and reviled me on the hills, I will measure into their laps full payment for their actions. ⁸ Thus says the Lord: As the wine is found in the cluster, and they say, "Do not destroy it, for there is a blessing in it," so I will do for my servants' sake, and not destroy them all. ⁹ I will bring forth descendants from Jacob, and from Judah inheritors of my mountains; my chosen shall inherit it, and my servants shall settle there.



Second Reading: Galatians 3:23-29

²³ Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. ²⁴ Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. ²⁵ But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, ²⁶ for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. ²⁷ As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. ²⁸ There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. ²⁹ And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

Children's Message



Gospel: Luke 8:26-39

²⁶ Then [Jesus and his disciples] arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. ²⁷ As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. ²⁸ When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me" — ²⁹ for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) ³⁰ Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. ³¹ They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

³² Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. ³³ Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the

³⁴ When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. ³⁵ Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. ³⁶ Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. ³⁷ Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. ³⁸ The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, ³⁹ "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.




New Salem's Highlighted Mission Partner



What the Club does every day helps improve the lives of children. Club activities support youth development in four key program areas:

- ACADEMIC SUCCESS to help youth achieve academic goals, stay in school, explore career interests, learn new skills and consider post-secondary education options.
- HEALTH & WELL-BEING to help youth engage in positive behaviors that nurture well-being, set personal goals and grow into self-sufficient adults, including daily physical activity, healthy food choices and an appreciation for the outdoors.
- CHARACTER & LEADERSHIP to empower youth to become engaged in the Club and the community, sustain meaningful relationships, and respect one another.
- LIFE & WORKFORCE READINESS to equip to navigate adulthood and pursue a fulfilling economically valuable career path.







The Boys & Girls Club of the Bemidji Area opened a Blackduck Branch of Club services in partnership with Blackduck Public School, colocating within the school at the start of the 2024 school year. The Blackduck Branch will serve up to 100 youth in grades K-8, operating all day Mondays when Blackduck school is not in session and after school Tuesday through Friday. The new branch is made possible by a grant, which will fund approximately 60 percent of the operations for the first two years. A lot of people have been working over the past four years to bring together the leadership and funding to make this

dream possible. We are grateful to the school leadership, United Way, and the whole Blackduck community for welcoming us and partnering with us to serve Blackduck youth.

Our garden program gives youth access to the agricultural process from planning to planting, weeding and watering to harvesting for the over 30 varieties of fruits, vegetables, and herbs. Youth have the opportunity to learn about the environment, healthy foods, importance of pollinators, and local growing systems. Garden produce is served in summer lunches and school-year snacks at the Club. The Garden produces over 1000 pounds of produce each season.

The Second Sunday of Pentecost

This Sunday's texts paint startling pictures of the horrific nature of sin. The church's repeated celebration of holy communion counters that tragic reality in a continued showing forth of the death of Jesus until he comes again. It is a dramatic declaration of "how much God has done for you." Today's readings collectively highlight both the imprisoning realities of sin and the life-changing effects of clothing ourselves with Christ and the identity he gives us.

Likely written to returned exiles (fifth century BCE), Isaiah 65 is God's defense to a faithless people. Their identified sins involve following their own devices, joining unorthodox rituals, engaging unclean spaces and foods, and yet professing upstanding piety. Using a familiar agricultural comparison, God promises to refrain from destroying the people and to cause them yet to inherit the land.

The Galatians reading portrays the law as a "disciplinarian" that "imprisoned" and "guarded" people before a new era of faith. The word for disciplinarian (paidagōgos) refers not to a disciplinarian or teacher per se, but to a childminder or nanny—a parental supervisor for a certain season of life. Paul tells believers that in Christ Jesus through faith they are children of God, anchoring the promise in a core Christian practice (baptism). Elsewhere Paul speaks of putting on Christ as clothing (Rom. 13:14; also Eph. 4:24), suggesting baptismal practices that involved donning new clothes. Galatians 3:28 is probably the most profound profession in scripture of eradicating binaries in Christ Jesus. The extent to which early Christian communities practiced this vision is difficult to say. Insofar as they did, it would have been profoundly countercultural—to the extent of inviting social dishonor.

The gospel story takes place in Gentile territory on Galilee's eastern shore among pigs and a tomb dweller—all of which were unclean for faithful Jews. Luke alone refers to "the abyss" (8:31), implying Jesus' ultimate authority over evil. Although many Euro-American readers find evil spirits incompatible with a scientific worldview, the global majority of Christians does not experience such great dissonance. The healed man's position "sitting at the feet of Jesus" (v. 35) is that of a learner-disciple (see 10:39; Acts 22:3). The Gerasene residents' request for Jesus to leave may stem from anger at lost livestock, fear of the unknown, or contentedness with status quo evil. Though Jesus tells the man to proclaim what "God has done for you" (v. 39), he shares what Jesus has done for him, indicating strong overlap between the activities of God and Jesus.
